Times: Registration 8-8:30am on Wed, Oct 10; 8:30am-4:30pm with one-hour lunch break for Wed and Thu sessions; 8:30am-2:30pm with 45-minute lunch break for Fri sessions.

Fee: \$1,095 through Sep 10; \$1,295 after, with \$500 deposit required at registration. Balance due by Oct 10. Total fee includes instruction, materials, continuing education units (CEUs), refreshments, and \$25 nonrefundable administrative fee. Have lunch on your own at the Memorial Union or any of the many restaurants near Pyle Center. Outside food items (including food from home) may not be consumed at Pyle Center.
